# Respite

Caring for a wounded veteran can be demanding physically, psychologically, and financially. Oftentimes, caregivers are spouses or family members who have many other responsibilities, such as work, managing bills and taking care of children. Caregivers of veterans often spend long hours caring for their loved one, feel high levels of stress and neglect their own personal health.

Wounded Warriors Family Support's Respite Care Program for the Caregiver and Veteran provides respite and supplemental services nationwide to the caregivers and families of wounded war veterans. Our program aims to ensure that family members who were thrust into the role of caregivers are provided with the support they need to keep their families intact while keeping themselves healthy.

Wounded Warriors Family Support's Respite Program focuses on injury, illness and medical events in the family including those of the veteran, the caregiver, and the dependent children. It may include services such as housekeeping, meals, child care, and transportation as deemed needed by our case management. The program also provides assistance with other agencies offering resources and support.

We provided thousands of hours of respite care for families in 2022, fulfilling 966 services.

# Retreats



Family Retreats provide wounded warriors and their families a peaceful, low-stress environment to heal and reconnect with their loved ones. Becoming stronger as individuals and families.

Wounded Warriors Family Support provides our families five nights at a Orlando hotel and passes to Universal Studios and LEGOLAND Florida for immediate family members. Preference going to those with children and the greatest financial need.

Staycations are a very popular option in the Family Retreats Program. Introduced in 2020, it is now our most used retreat offering. Staycations allow families to stay close to home, support their local communities, while getting away from the stressors of daily life. Staycations also provide more options for families with medical conditions that make travel difficult.

Wounded Warriors Family Support sent 181 families on Family Retreats in 2022.

# Mobility

In 2022, the “Mobility Is Freedom” program once again addressed the need for veterans to have reliable, mobility-equipped vehicles to drive. The program gives wounded veterans added freedom and independence to live productive and quality lives with their families.

The Mobility is Freedom program grew with continued partnerships with the EOD Warrior Foundation, Driver Rehabilitation Center of Excellence, and many others who assist with identifying veterans in need of custom, mobility-equipped vehicles.

Wounded Warriors Family Support presented 27 qualified veterans with vehicle grants in 2022. During the calendar year, \$997,144 was spent on the Mobility is Freedom program.

# Welding

Our nation's military veterans have fulfilled great commitments in protecting our country's freedom. When returning to civilian life, these veterans often have difficulty finding jobs.

UAW-Ford and Wounded Warriors Family Support collaborate to provide a job training program in welding for U.S. military veterans. UAW-Ford offers six-week training classes where qualified veterans train and test for 1G through 6G welding certification. The program prepares participants for apprenticeships and entry-level positions throughout the country in industries such as automotive, ship building, and construction fields.

Wounded Warriors Family Support trained 24 veterans in 2022. These classes included many female veterans as well. During the calendar year, \$147,477 was spent on the Veteran Welding Training program.

# Soldier Support

Soldier Support provides veterans and their families with unmet needs through direct support for utility payments, emergency funding, travel grants, educational grants, and natural disaster assistance. These needs vary by family and circumstances.

We improve the quality of life for military families and help “fill the gaps” for services not provided by the Veteran Administration and other organizations.

During the 2022 calendar year, \$785,390 was spent on Soldier Support and Unmet Needs.
